Introduction

The Association of INGOs in Nepal comprises some 34 member organisations, which come together with the aim of facilitating coordination amongst ourselves as well as promoting mutual understanding of our contribution towards development activities in Nepal.

AIN member organisations wish to acknowledge that we work with or under the auspices of the Government of Nepal in accordance with established and evolving development policy and programming priorities, and in line with the needs & priorities of our partners.

Some INGOs have direct agreements with HMG/N, others have agreements with the Social Welfare Council based on approval from relevant Line Ministries.

Statement of principles

1. Identity and Role of INGOs in Nepal

INGOs have a long history of community and policy development in countries throughout the world. We acknowledge that we are working in Nepal at the invitation of His Majesty's Government and in support of humanitarian aid and development objectives. Our focus is on the alleviation of poverty and on promotion of the well-being of individuals, families, and communities.

2. Governance

INGOs work under either a national, regional or international board of elected members or trustees. Each INGO works to its organisational charter which informs and guides on such matters as ethics, scope and focus of work. We actively seek transparency in our activities and are accountable internationally to our headquarters' management, and to the donors and individuals who fund our work. We are accountable nationally to HMG/N, under the procedures laid down by the Government, and to our partners in development, whether local organisations or beneficiaries.

3. Funding

Funding mechanisms are normally operated through the INGO's central governing and managing body. Funding sources are diverse and include individuals, support groups, charitable fund-raising activities, special campaigns, as well as governmental, bilateral and multilateral grants. Additionally some financial resources come from multilateral and bilateral agencies in Nepal which, as a matter of policy, use local mechanisms for channeling support through INGOs in the light of our comparative advantage in particular development activities and/or sectors. Through such mechanisms, INGOs provide support to local NGOs, thereby contributing to their fund-raising and implementation capacity. We do not seek to divert or compete for funding destined for the local NGO sector in Nepal.

4. Mode of Operation

The INGO contribution to the development process covers a variety of working modalities including sectoral, multi-sectoral, direct implementation, and local agency/group partnerships. INGO teams are staffed primarily by local personnel and usually, but not always, include a small number of expatriates in representational, managerial or technical support roles.

5. The Association of INGOs in Nepal (AIN)

The founder members of AIN agreed on Articles of Association effective from September 1996. The Association was formed to enable INGOs to facilitate coordination amongst the member INGOs and to advocate for equitable development in Nepal with a strong commitment to focus on issues affecting the poorest and most disadvantaged sectors of society. The focus to date has been on complementarity within sectors and between agencies, partnerships, networking, and poverty alleviation through access to disadvantaged groups. The members of AIN understand that we are in a position to work in collaboration with HMG/N through the private sector, non-governmental organisations, community-based organisations and networks in order to build community infrastructure and empower members of civil society. Advocacy and the promotion of Human Rights remain a priority both nationally and internationally for AIN members.

6. Partnerships in Development

We, as INGOs do not perceive ourselves as “donors” but as partners in the development process. We are in an excellent position to support the development efforts of NGOs, CBOs and other community structures as well as Government. Our contribution should thus be understood as an integral part of the Development Process. Partnerships may include local government, the corporate sector, informal institutions and other local alliances. Although INGOs have moved towards partnerships as their mode of operation, it should be recognised that we are also well equipped to work directly with various elements of civil society in dual partnership. We value this plurality of options.

The AIN survey

The overall aim of the survey was to clarify the range, volume and locations of AIN member INGOs’ programmes in Nepal.

The survey was designed to:

- ◆ portray AIN members’ work by region and district so that duplication can be avoided
- ◆ enhance co-operation among organisations working in similar sectors in Nepal
- ◆ identify districts where very few development initiatives are carried out by AIN members
- ◆ enable feedback to His majesty’s Government and other development stakeholders

The survey was conducted using a structured questionnaire, completed by all AIN members during 1999. This method of data collection has proved to have limitations because of:

- ◆ the tremendous diversity in the nature and activities of AIN Members, making capturing & analysing information within one format a complex task
- ◆ inconsistency of members’ interpretation of questions
- ◆ significant time required for initial responses, analysis and follow-up checking

However, whilst acknowledging that there will be unavoidable inaccuracies, AIN is keen to publish the tables that follow as the end result of the survey. These findings complete this first public information-sharing initiative and we hope that it will largely achieve its aims.

We warmly welcome any feedback from readers, in order that we can learn and improve future surveys & reports of this type.
