2. INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

Education is one of the key priorities of Save the Children (SC). Under education, Early Childhood Care and Development (ECCD) and Basic Education (BE) are the sub-thematic areas in which Save the Children has been investing its resources since long. Ensuring equitable access to quality basic education and ECCDs services is one of the mandates of educational intervention in both humanitarian and development context. Save the Children, a learning organization, also invests its resources innovating new spirations and solutions that best serve the felt needs and best interest of beneficiaries we work for. In the context of COVID-19, when all the academic institutions were closed, SC adapted some innovative solutions and took them forward to best address the learning and development needs of the children ultimately proven as the best practices of SC.

In context of Nepal, there are some ECCD centres developed as model ECCD centres and known for their excellent ECCD services for their children's overall learning and development. In this context, exploration, documentation and dissemination of those novel practices, measures and initiatives to impart quality ECCD services to the young people would be worth to inspire people working in the field of ECCDs and basic education. Therefore, SC intends to partner with a resource organization/research firm to conduct a qualitative study to dig out and document those good and innovative practices that could be contextual, replicable and adaptive to other contexts.

3. SCOPE OF STUDY

3.1 Purpose, Objectives and Scope

This study is being conducted for learning new, innovative and adaptive measures and instructional practices by ECCD centres and teachers that have resulted into greater learning and development gains of young people. The proven practices/models and innovations addressing the issues around learning and development crisis of young people will be explored in general and specific targeting to girls, children with disabilities and other most deprived and marginalized children. The consultant(s) have to develop the basis for the selection of model ECCD centres and proven practices/models that contributed to addressing the learning and development crisis of young children of 3-5 years of age.

Similarly, substantial information such as progressive trend on the learning and development of the children in ECCDs will be required to consider/validate as proven practices/models. In the COVID-19 context, if there is an unavailability of the overall learning achievement of the children, validation of the information is required through the qualitative information. The study will be carried out in some selected model ECCDs of all the provinces with special focus to Madhesh and Karnali Province. The primary purpose of this study is to prepare a resource document of proven practices and innovations so that these could be replicated and scaled up across the country in both humanitarian and development context.

The study main objectives are:

- To explore the proven practices/models, innovations, and new initiatives taken by the teachers and ECCDs proven in increased learning and developmental potentials of children of age 3-5 years in general and specific to girls, children with disabilities and other most deprived and marginalized children.

- To document the in-depth case study of proven practices/models, innovations, and new initiatives in general and specific to girls, children with disabilities and other most deprived and marginalized children.
- To recommend the practices those are adaptable and scalable in other location, and context.
- To prepare a high level external sharable research report including maximum of five pagers summary both in English and Nepali language.

3.2 Intended Audience and Use of the Study

The primary intended audience of the study is SCI and Nepal government. The study aims to generate evidences as a basis for advocacy to all three tiers of government in replicating the best practices in the larger context. Beside, it also provides insights to SCI country offices to learn and adapt the ideas based on their context and feasibility. Similarly, the Nepal Country Office will also use the findings to adapt the program based on the findings and recommendation of the study.

3.3 Key Study Questions

The key research questions are as follows:

- Which innovations and new initiatives were found to be most effective in increasing learning and developmental domains of children in general and by gender and marginalized children including CWD? Why/ How?
- Can those adopted practices and approaches be replicable and scaled up in a different locations and contexts? What practices are recommendable for scaling up?

4. STUDY METHODOLOGY

4.1 Study Design

It is expected that this study will involve:

- Qualitative and in-depth case study

This is a general guideline for the research design. The respondents of the research are ECCD management committees, ECCD facilitators, HTs, parents and local government representatives. The research methods include ECCDs observations, KII, FGDs, case study and review of relevant literature. The consultancy firm can purpose elaborative study design based on this TOR and objectives of the study.

4.2 Sampling

The sampling method to be used for study will be non-probability sampling methods specifically purposive sampling. The consultation firm and SCI can decide the number of sample size and criteria for selecting the sample.

4.3 Data Sources and Data Collection Methods / Tools

The consultation firm can purpose data collection method based on the scenario and feasibility of the current situation. Separate data collection tools and guiding question should be developed by the consultant and approved by SCI for data collection. Therefore, adequate consultations should be done with SCI Education advisor, Senior MEAL Coordinator, and Education Specialist to finalize the data collection tools. Data analysis should be carried out using data analysis software.

The study team is required to adhere to the Save the Children Child Safeguarding: Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse; Anti-Harassment, Intimidation and Bullying; and Data Protection and Privacy] policies throughout all project activities.

4.4 Ethical Considerations

It is expected that this study will be:

- **Child participatory.** Where appropriate and safe, children should be supported to participate in the evaluation process beyond simply being respondents. Opportunities for collaborative participation could include involving children in determining success criteria against which the project could be evaluated, supporting children to collect some of the data required for the evaluation themselves, or involving children in the validation of findings. Any child participation, whether consultative, collaborative or child-led, must abide by the [9 Basic Requirements for meaningful and ethical child participation](#).
- **Inclusive.** Ensure that children from different ethnic, social and religious backgrounds have the chance to participate, as well as children with disabilities and children who may be excluded or discriminated against in their community.
- **Ethical:** The study must be guided by the following ethical considerations:
 - Safeguarding – demonstrating the highest standards of behaviour towards children and adults.
 - Sensitive – to child rights, gender, inclusion and cultural contexts.
 - Openness - of information given, to the highest possible degree to all involved parties.

- Confidentiality and data protection - measures will be put in place to protect the identity of all participants and any other information that may put them or others at risk.¹
- Public access - to the results when there are not special considerations against this
- Broad participation - the relevant parties should be involved where possible.
- Reliability and independence - the study should be conducted so that findings and conclusions are correct and trustworthy.

It is expected that:

- Data collection methods will be age and gender appropriate.
- Study activities will provide a safe, creative space where children feel that their thoughts and ideas are important.
- A risk assessment will be conducted that includes any risks related to children, young people's, or adult's participation.
- A referral mechanism will be in place in case any child safeguarding or protection issues arise.
- Informed consent will be used where possible.

- Sound and proven experience in conducting evaluations based on OECD-DAC evaluation criteria, particularly utilisation and learning focused evaluations
- Strong written and verbal skills in communicating technical and/ or complex findings to non-specialist audiences (especially report writing and presentation skills)
- A track record of open, collaborative working with clients

- A team leader will be appointed who has the seniority and experience in leading complex study projects, and who has the ability and standing to lead a team toward a common goal.
