Background on Save the Children

Background information/context

Tuberculosis (TB) is the world's leading infectious disease killer. International declines in incidence of 1.5% per year are lagging well behind the declines required (7-10%) if the Sustainable Development Goal of ending TB by 2030 is to be met. Recognition that more needs to be done, particularly in meeting the needs of the large number of people who are not diagnosed or successfully treated (approximately 4.5 million people per annum globally) has resulted in a revitalized focus on the international TB response - not least with the convening of the first United Nations General Assembly (UNGASS) high level meeting on TB set for September 2018. Concomitantly, international bodies and National TB Program are scaling up their efforts to meet the aims outlined in the Global Plan to End TB (2016–2020): reach at least 90% of all people with TB, reach at least 90% of vulnerable and hard to reach population, and achieve at least 90% treatment success for all people diagnosed.

In support of these ambitious targets, the Stop TB Partnership is supporting an array of countries to implement national Community, Rights and Gender (CRG) assessments. These assessments are comprised of 3 components: Key Populations, Legal Environment and Gender, with the recognition that these are often neglected areas of research and implementation but play an important role in successful national TB response outcomes. Each assessment examines



the respective impact of the research area on TB vulnerability, access to care and treatment outcomes in the national context.

TB is one of the leading public health problems in Nepal and one of the priority programs of Ministry of Health and Population. It is estimated that annually 69,000 new cases develop TB in Nepal. However only 28,677 cases were notified to National TB Program (NTP) in 2021. This clearly shows a wide gap in the estimated cases and reported cases in Nepal. The COVID pandemic has further aggravated the problem of missing TB cases in Nepal.

Nepal is committed to meeting the global milestones and targets as set by the Sustainable Development Goals, WHO's end TB strategy, Moscow declaration to end TB and the STPs global plan to end TB. Nepal is an also a signatory to the political declaration of UN General assembly high level meeting on TB which has proposed a set of ambitious targets to end TB by 2030. Some of the other key activities that are required for countries to eliminate TB are protecting and promoting the right to health and access to affordable medicines, ending the stigma & discrimination against TB, promotion of social & psychosocial support for TB patients, meaningful participation of vulnerable and TB affected people in decision making process, strengthening gender equality in TB response, and ensuring multi-sectoral collaboration in TB response. In this regards the Stop TB partnership has selected Nepal as one of the countries for the assessment of the current situation of impact of gender, key population affiliation and the national legal environment on Tuberculosis vulnerability, diagnosis, and treatment in Nepal. The assessment in Nepal will be led by National Tuberculosis Centre (NTC) whereas technical & financial assistance for this assessment will be provided by Save the Children and Trishuli Plus with the support from STOP TB Partnership and Global Fund.

Objective

The Objective of this consultancy is to:

- Providing qualitative insights into the ways that gender, belonging to certain key
 populations and the legal environment of a country impact on vulnerability to TB infection,
 access to care, and treatment outcomes.
- Providing information on how the TB response can improve to be more gender-sensitive and more responsive to key populations.
- Assessing and making recommendations for a strengthened legal and regulatory framework for improved access to TB diagnosis, treatment, and care.

Scope of Work

- Review of existing literatures and secondary data on national laws, regulations on Tuberculosis, international conventions signatory.
- Adaptation of the assessment protocol and finalization of the protocol for the assessment.
- Primary data collection through key informant interviews (KIIs) and focus group discussions (FGDs) at seven provinces with TB survivor groups.
- Preliminary dissemination and validation of primary and secondary data through sharing at the national workshops with key stakeholders
- Finalization of report by incorporating the feedbacks and suggestions from the stakeholders provided in the validation workshops
- Finalization of the report.
- Dissemination of the report
